About Kardan University

Founded in 2002, Kardan University is the first and leading private university in Afghanistan. Over 4,000 students, 25 percent of whom are women, currently pursue diploma, undergraduate and graduate programs at Kardan University's three campuses in Kabul. With an alumni network of 30,000, Kardan University is a household name in Afghanistan renowned for its academic excellence.

More than 600 of Kardan University graduates have received prestigious graduate scholarships, including Fulbright, Chevening, DAAD and more.

Kardan University has received business program accreditation through the International Accreditation Council for Business Education (IACBE) and is candidate for accreditation with ACBSP and AACSB. We are also member of CHEA International Quality Group (CIQG), Asia Pacific Quality Network (APQN) and Global Business School Network (GBSN).

In 2012, Kardan University helped lay the foundation of the Association of Private Universities and Institutes of Higher Education in Afghanistan and served as its elected Chair for two consecutive terms. Kardan University's strategic initiatives are articulated in its Vision of Excellence, a five-year strategic plan (2015-2020), promoting excellence in research, faculty development, student growth and public engagement. In September 2018, Kardan University earned Ministry of Higher Education's national accreditation and became the top ranking institution among both public and privateuniversities in Afghanistan.

Kardan University plays a leadership role in Afghanistan that focus on researching, developing, and demonstrating sustainable practices. With nearly 100 faculty members and 120 active research society members investigating sustainability, our goal is to excel across the spectrum of fundamental and applied research.

There are currently 10+ research groups exploring sustainability related issues like Poverty reduction, Economic growth, and Quality Education.

The Department of Research and Development (DRD) is highly committed in fostering those topics which are related to sustainability issues. More than 40 percent of students are working on

sustainability related issues during their Master degree thesis.

QUALITY EDUCATION



Quality Education

This goal emphasizes on ensuring inclusive and equitable quality education and promoting lifelong learning opportunities for all.

Education is a key gateway out of inequalities, especially multi-generational ones. In addition to improving quality of life, access to inclusive education can help equip locals with the tools required to develop innovative solutions to the world's greatest problems.

SDG 4 explores early years and lifelong learning. Education is a precursor to growing an economy sustainably, not just at higher education levels, but importantly in early years and lifelong learning. It is a gateway out of poverty, especially intergenerational poverty.

Education delivered fairly helps to break down inequalities, and provides the key workers needed to support a fair and sustainable world.

2.1 THE LEARNING SCHOOLS MODEL

Given the significance of quality education at the primary level, Kardan university initiated Kardan International School (KIS) which is Afghanistan's first and only digital school. The school brings together international best practices in the education sector and combines them with local expertise to respond to the growing demand for quality education in the country.

Kardan International School offers international curriculum, mixed faculty of teachers, and expert school management to nurture student growth.

The main objective behind starting KIS is to redefining primary and secondary education in Afghanistan. Kardan represents the most recognizable brand in the education sector in Afghanistan with over a decade of experience in providing primary, secondary, and post-secondary education services.

With a focus on innovation and renewal, Kardan has been at the forefront of a vigorous drive to enhance the quality of education offered in the country.

2.2 EDUCATION FOR ALL

Kardan University is committed to increasing access, retention and achievement for low socioeconomic status students, and has in place a number of programmes such as Financial Assistance (FA), Merit Scholarship (MS), Public Service and Athletic Scholarship (AS), Partners Scholarship (PS), Chancellor Office (CO), Equal Opportunity Scholarship, and Financial Aid for students who fall into the bottom 20% of household income group.

In addition to above, Kardan University, in collaboration with USAID, is actively working on giving furtherance to the cause of women empowerment under the Women Scholarship Endowment (WSE) scheme.

The overall goal of the WSE initiative is to assist Afghan women in obtaining undergraduate or graduate education in science, technology, engineering, or mathematics (STEM) fields and empowering them to play leading roles in the community and society.

2.4 LIFELONG LEARNING OPPORTUNITIES PROVIDED

Kardan University is taking a number of initiatives to ensure lifelong learning opportunities which eventually lead to wellbeing. The four international research journals are available to the University community and general public.

In addition, the University offers access to JSTOR database. The availability of these resources to our students and community helps in fostering the culture of reading and research which is the backbone for bringing uplift in the quality of education.

In the year 2020, the University hosted a total of 86 mega educational events, both online and inside the campus. These events mainly focused on major socio-economic issues such as role of transit trade in economic development, peace journalism, awareness campaign regarding environmental issues, climate, use of coal in central heating, poverty reduction, quality education and peace.

2.5 SUCCESS AT UNIVERSITY

The Student Success Center (SSC) at Kardan University is established to help students to fulfil their academic potential while at the University by providing an environment that supports students via tutorials, workshops, study groups and sessions with tutors and mentors.

Furthermore, SSC offers a range of specialized training workshop and services such as developing CVs, interview skills, and proposal writings etc. to assist students and alumni in achieving their career goals.

As a result of these initiatives, SSC has been successful in finding internships and job placement opportunities for our student including both males and females. All the major educational events are publicly available. Kardan University strictly adheres to the policy of no discrimination among students and public to participate in the events organized by the university.

Further, all our policies at Kardan University aims to build and maintain an educational community carrying a culture of mutual trust, fairness, transparency, respect and justice.

2.7 STUDY OF SUSTAINABILITY

Kardan University, in addition to 'sustainable economy' as a major in Economic degree, offers compulsory environment related courses at the undergraduate level to enhance students' awareness concerning environmental issues.

In addition, Kardan students at graduate level are encouraged to undertake research projects that serve to improve sustainable practices within the University or their communities.

As part of University's commitment towards sustainability, the next 5-year strategic plan (2021-25) plan is focused on introduction of additional sustainability related studies.

2.8 TEACHING, LEARNING, AND RESERCH

As part of quality education, Kardan University is committed to fostering the knowledge, skills and experience of students in order for them to serve as agents of change, community leaders, and responsible global citizens.

Kardan University's ambitious goals are for all students to have access to sustainability learning alongside their chosen degree program; to create diverse learning and co-curricular engagement opportunities for students; and to be global leaders in applied research on sustainable behaviour, infrastructure, and communities. Realizing the significance of research in the higher education sector and given the fact that research is a means towards ensuring quality education, Kardan University established a 'Research Society (RS)' with a long-term objective to create the culture of research and improve the research capacity in Afghanistan. RS has numerous members (internal and external) serving for the cause of exploring socioeconomic problems (i.e., poverty,

social entrepreneurship, women empowerment to name a few) in Afghanistan and offering research-based solution to the key actors in different socio-economic sectors.

To support research agenda such as capacity building programs, research seminars, conferences and publication, the University offer special grants.



3.1 Decent Work and Economic Growth: Publications

The Research and Development at Kardan University is focused on identifying the real socio-economic challenges facing Afghanistan.

The four international journals, Kardan Journal of Economics and Management Sciences (KJEMS), Kardan Journal of Social Sciences and Humanities (KJSSH), Kardan Journal of Engineering and Technology (KJET), and Kardan Journal of Law (KJL) reflects the real societal issues and offers research-based solutions. One of the prime focus of these journals are decent work and economic growth where the total of 24% of published articles target issues related to decent work and economic growth.

3.3 Creating Public Awareness and Engagement about SDGs
